# Steps to minimize slip hazards

A drop of liquid. A pinch of sand. A small scrap of cardboard. That's all it takes to create the potential for slips and falls. According to the United States Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, more than 602,000 workers were injured by slips, trips and falls to the same level in 2004, and averaged seven to nine lost work days as a result of the incident.

Keeping floors clean and dry is a key factor in preventing these injuries, but that often can be a daunting task. Even the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) acknowledges that it isn't always possible to keep a floor clean and dry. You have little control over a walking/working surface when you are servicing an account. Therefore, your awareness of the walking surface condition becomes paramount.
